State of Cities and Schools Report is Optimistic

The reports from the mayors, city managers, and the new superintendent of schools at the annual State of the Cities breakfast were all posi-

tive and optimistic. Sponsored by the Farmington/Farmington Hills Chamber of Commerce and held at the Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Company, the meeting was attended by civic leaders and members of the Chamber. The presentations were

highlighted by the first public appearance by the new superintendent of the Farmington School District, C. Robert Maxfield.

Farmington Hills mayor Larry Lichtman opened the meeting with a joke about the rumor of the Tigers locating to the city. "Thank you for running prosperous businesses," he said more seriously to the business people in attendance. He updated the finalization of the Mercy Center purchase at a price of \$3.05 million, with another \$900,000 earmarked for renovations. The 85 acre Founders Sports Park first phase will be completed this year with the opening of a concession stand to go along with the four ball and three soccer fields. "The city is run best when run like a business," he said.

The citizens committee to study the proposed ice arena has completed their work and the report is in the hands of the council. "I'm proud to say the group was dedicated and rep-

resented a wide cross section of residents," said Lichtman. Public comment on the proposal is set to begin.

A hoarse Bill Costick turned his portion over to assistants Dave Call and Steve Brock. Call reported that the Haggerty connector project is proceeding on schedule, with much of the interchange and 12 Mile improvements completed. The initial phase of the project is set to be in use by this fall, with the next portion to begin construction next year. Funding is also in place to expand the final section of 12 Mile between Drake and Halstead to a four lane boulevard, and is set to begin construction April of 1995.

The Los Angeles earthquake has put a crimp in the funding for the M-102 overpass project, reported Brock. Information gathered for the demonstration project by a California congressman was lost in the quake, and is
